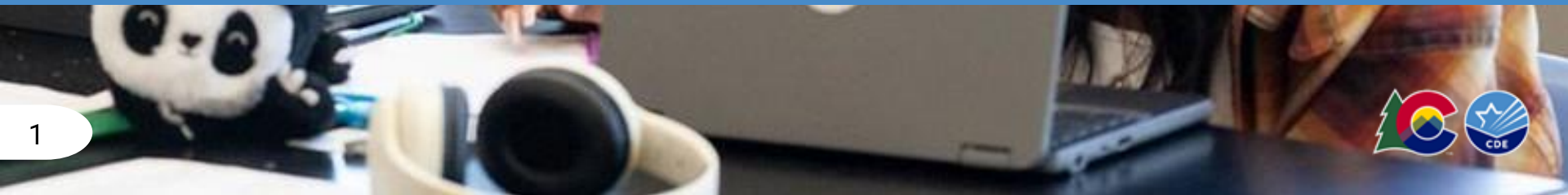




# The Colorado State Board of Education

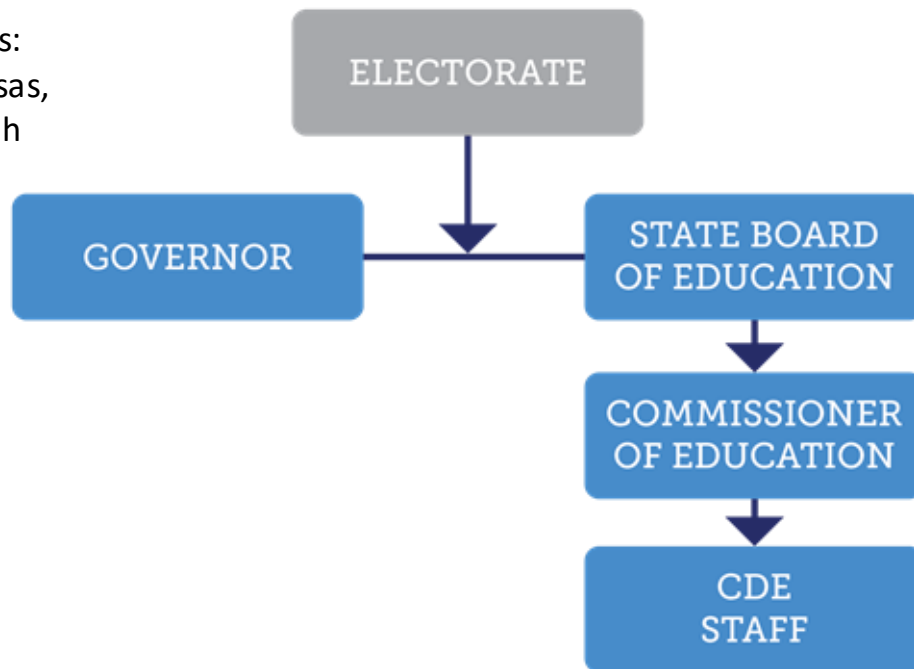

# Colorado's Education Governance Model

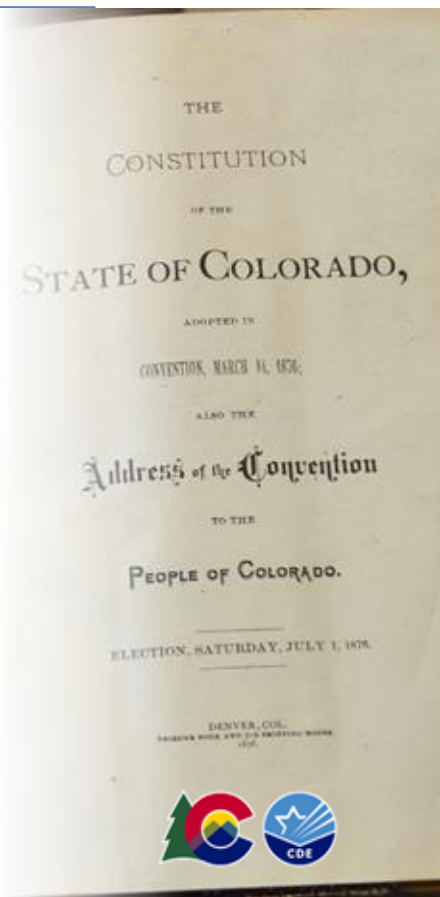
Model shared by 6 states:

# State Board of Education Constitutional Authority

The Colorado Constitution, in Article IX, Section 1, states:

*"The **general supervision** of the public schools of the state shall be vested in a board of education whose powers and duties shall be as now or hereafter prescribed by law."*



# State Board Statutory Authority

Title 22 of the Colorado Revised Statutes outlines the roles and responsibilities of the state board, including:

Education***

***Adopting state  
standards,  
assessments and  
graduation guidelines***

***Evaluating and  
monitoring school  
performance (i.e.,  
annual targets, district  
accreditation, etc.)***

***Adopting rules for  
education programs  
and grants***

*Adopting educator  
performance  
standards and  
licensure requirements*

*Hearing charter school  
appeals*

*Approving grant  
recipients and  
amounts*

*Granting waivers from  
state education  
statutes*
